

CPD Program-level requirement:

Culturally Safe Practice

Australian doctors must dedicate part of their annual CPD time to fostering Culturally Safe Practice. This requires completing at least one relevant CPD activity each year that addresses this requirement and aligns with their specific scope of practice.

All program-level CPD requirements are aligned to the Australian Medical Council's **Good medical practice: a code of conduct for doctors in Australia** (the code). It is suggested to start there when starting to plan CPD activities that are aligned with these requirements.

The code states that cultural safety: *“acknowledges the social, economic, cultural, historic and behavioural factors influencing the health of individuals, communities and populations, and involves understanding what individual patients and/or their family believe is culturally safe”.*

Meeting Cultural Safety, as stated by (the code) requires:

- understanding how your own culture, values, attitudes, assumptions, and beliefs influence your interactions
- respecting the diverse cultures, beliefs, gender identities, sexualities, and experiences of people
- a genuine effort to adapt your practice
- avoiding bias, discrimination and racism
- challenging assumptions that may be based on, for example, gender, disability, race, ethnicity, religion, sexuality, age or political beliefs

ACRRM prioritises culturally safe care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and diverse communities through its curriculum, practice domains and CPD program.
